A total of 36 states have legalized sports gambling since 2018. In 2022, Americans legally wagered more than \$100 billion solely on sports. And the nation's casinos and mobile gaming apps grossed a record-breaking \$54.93 billion plus in revenue.

But for nearly 6% of Americans struggling with compulsive gambling, this isn't just a game. It's risking everything—their financial future, relationships, mental well-being and lives. Still, there's minimal understanding of the challenges we face in prevention, treatment and research.
